

NO To Medicaid Budget Cuts

IDA Urges Congress to Reject Funding Reductions

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Executive Summary

Early Intervention (EI) services through California's Early Start program are essential for promoting healthy development in children ages zero to three with disabilities or developmental delays. Through speech-language, occupational, and physical therapy, El improves long-term outcomes in school readiness and health while also reducing future costs to state education and healthcare systems. Medi-Cal, California's version of Medicaid, insures nearly half of California's children, covering prenatal to early childhood El services and supporting children with special needs in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). The proposed, up to \$880 billion, federal Medicaid budget cuts would significantly reduce California's ability to sustain Early Start. IDA urges Congress to vote NO to these cuts to protect California's youngest and most vulnerable residents. Investing in early intervention is not just fiscally responsible, it is morally imperative for California's future.

The Importance of Medi-Cal

Early Intervention provides essential support for children aged 0 to 3 with developmental delays or disabilities. Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act ensures access to free, individualized education and support services for children with disabilities, such as:

- Speech-language therapy → speaking and communicating
- Audiology services → hearing
- Occupational therapy -> completing daily tasks
- Physical therapy → movement

After EI: 14

- 40% of children made significant improvements in motor and communication domains.
- 21.7% improved in cognition and 22.8% in adaptive skills.

Necessity of Federal Funding

Medi-Cal is the primary public insurer of El services.

Reduced funding would lead to: 9,10

- Fewer children receiving critical El care at the most essential stage of brain development, risking lifelong cognitive, emotional, and behavioral challenges.
- California's entire health system suffering, with cuts impacting:
 - o Pediatric care
 - o Mental health services
 - Support for children and adults with disabilities ightarrow These services are often the first to be reduced or eliminated when

Without Medi-Cal \rightarrow states will lose essential funding for:

- Vital services for low-income families.
- Reducing health disparities.
- Supporting working families who rely on access to care and early intervention.

Medi-Cal accounts for 60% of all federal funding sent to the state.

The Impact of Early Start Services

In California, Early Start serves as the state's Part C program under IDEA. El services improve 14

- Parent-child interactions
- Family stability
- School readiness
- Significant developmental gains in motor, communication, and adaptive skills

El is developmentally impactful and fiscally responsible, helping to reduce future costs in special education, social services, and healthcare. Medi-Cal is an investment in children's futures: those enrolled are more likely to miss fewer school days, graduate from high school, experience better overall health, and earn higher wages later in life. El reduces the need for special education services once children enter kindergarten. Early Start funding yields a significant return on

investment, demonstrating the long-term fiscal benefits of early intervention services.

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Threats Posed by Proposed Funding Reductions

Congressional proposals to slash up to \$880 billion in Medicaid federal funding would severely impact California's most vulnerable children and Early Start services.

Impact on Early Start Families and Why It's an Issue:

- Necessary developmental and optional services, such as speech and physical therapies, may be reduced or eliminated.
- Access to Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic, and Treatment (EPSDT) may be restricted, a benefit that provides essential preventative, medical and treatment services for children at their earliest stages of need. 15

Impact on long-term health outcomes:

- With fewer intervention services available, children with disabilities and chronic illnesses will be put at a higher risk of lifelong consequences.
- Over time, worsened health outcomes will lead to increased healthcare costs.

With so much to lose, it is essential that Medicaid funding is not cut.
